- b. Recreation Objectives include:
 - i. Identify and prioritize family recreation and physical activities to be made available in 3 school districts during non-school hours. We have identified yoga, martial arts, boxing, aerobics
 - ii. In collaboration with County Parks and Rec. identify instructors to provide a minimum of 2 recreational/fitness activities or programs in each of the 3 school districts
 - iii. Work out joint use agreements with 3 school districts to implement recreation on site
 - iv. HLN partners will expand the fitness activities offered within their represented agencies
 - v. Inventory the recreation/fitness activities available within the HLN organizations and community, and market these to the community to promote increased utilization
- c. Nutrition Objectives:
 - i. CATCH Coordinator will work within 3 school districts to integrate and enhance physical ed/fitness, food service and nutrition efforts
 - ii. 30 teachers, school food service directors and administrators will receive CATCH training
 - iii. HLN partners will implement ENACT nutrition and fitness priorities within their own organizations as identified in the interagency MOU
 - iv. HLN administrators will establish procedures for monitoring and sharing progress on implementation of CATCH priorities
- d. Common Data Element Objectives:
 - i. Convene a workgroup to identify key data elements that can be shared among them as a means to establish a centralized repository of health data and a systematic methodology for data collection
 - ii. HLN will collaborate with Public Health to implement the shared data collection system and make data available for advocacy and on-going policy development efforts
